

LESSON TITLE: Jesus Calms a Storm

THEME: We should never be afraid when Jesus is with us.

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 8:23-27

In the lesson this week, we learned about the time when **Jesus calmed a storm** (**Matthew 8:23-27**). We encourage you to review these scriptures with your child. They had forgotten that Jesus was there with them, all of the time.

The disciples learned a valuable lesson about trusting in Jesus. When we have troubles, we should never be afraid, for Jesus is with us!

A Scary Day

Text: Isaiah 12:2 - "Behold, God is my salvation, I will trust and not be afraid; 'For YAH, the LORD, is my strength and my song; He also has become my salvation."

Also read Isaiah 12:1-6

John and Jennifer were following their parents all morning at the flea market. It was a lot of fun. They looked at all the bright colored toys, tried on some clothes, and had some soda to drink. Mom had a particular booth she wanted see, so Dad motioned to John to pick up the pace. They were following just fine until a "kid's discovery" booth stopped the two kids in their tracks. For the moment, they completely forgot they were following Mom and Dad. When they looked up, Mom and Dad were gone! Jennifer panicked and cried, "Where's Mom and Dad!" to her brother. They called loudly for their parents, making their way as quickly as they could through the crowded streets. Loud music blared from the speakers, drowning their calls. Each turn, with no sight of Mom and Dad among all the faces, made them feel more lost.

Jennifer began to cry. John held her hand, "Jennifer, we need to pray! God can hear our prayers. He knows where we are right now and where Mom and Dad are." The two children bowed their heads and prayed, "Oh God, You see we are lost, and You know where Mom and Dad are. Please help us find them. Please show us what to do. In Jesus' name."

They felt much better after praying. Remembering that God could take care of them made a big difference. The children continued their search. The loud speaker continued to blare one song followed by another. Suddenly, an idea came to John. He grabbed Jennifer's hand tightly and hurriedly made his way to the ice cream stand. "We're lost!" exclaimed John. "Is it possible to announce where we are over speakers so our parents can find us." "No problem" responded the ice cream vendor in an assuring voice. I'll make that arrangement."

Soon John and Jennifer spotted their relieved parents making their way through the crowds toward them. "Finally, here you are!" sighed Mom. "While we're here, let's celebrate with ice cream!" announced Dad gleefully. John was excited to share their experience of God's faithfulness. "We were scared at first," admitted John, "then we prayed and trusted God!"

Walking On Water

Text: Matthew 14:27- "But immediately Jesus spoke to them, saying, 'be of good cheer! It is I; do not be afraid."

Also read Matthew 14:22-33

Jesus needed time alone to pray to the Father. He told His disciples to sail across the sea ahead of Him. It had been several days since the last storm on the sea; once again, the disciples were on their way across the water, only this time without Jesus. Peter watched as a storm blew in their direction. Several days earlier they had encountered such a storm. Jesus had been with them, then. He had calmed the raging sea with just a few words. Now, however, Jesus was not in the ship. Once again, the disciples became frightened for their lives! What were they going to do?

Peter thought he spotted something coming toward the boat on the water, perhaps another ship. It was hard to tell with all of the wind and rain. The object was small but it moved strangely, not affected by the wind or waves. The disciples were troubled and cried out in fear as the object drew near. Could it be a spirit? Suddenly, Jesus spoke through the tumult of the wind and waves. "Be of good cheer! It is I; do not be afraid." It was Jesus! He was walking on the water.

Peter called out to the Lord, "Lord, if it is You, command me come to you on the water." Jesus said, "Come." Peter took a few steps on the rough, rolling sea, steps of faith that held him for a few moments. Trusting Jesus, He walked on water! However, Peter made a mistake. Taking his eyes off Jesus, he looked at the rolling sea and the tumultuous waves. Frightened, Peter began to sink. He cried out, "Lord save Me!" Jesus stretched out His hand and caught His friend. Jesus asked, "O you of little faith, why did you doubt?" As they reached the boat, the wind ceased.

No doubt the fierce wind and turbulent sea was not easy to ignore, but Peter's faith faltered when he took his eyes off Jesus and onto the storm. We, too, will falter in our faith when we take our eyes off our Jesus and focus on the scary situation. Jesus was in control of the wind and waves that troubled Peter. Jesus is in control of the wind and waves that trouble us. We can trust Him.

Tornado Watch

Text: Matthew 8:26b - "Then He arose and rebuked the winds and the sea, and there was a great calm."

Also read Matthew 8:23-27

Joshua knew a storm was coming; he hurried his brother by carrying his backpack and held his little sister's hand. The wind became so strong the three children had trouble walking against it down the block to their house. When they got home, Mom hugged all three children tightly, and told them about the "tornado watch" announced on the radio. Scooting Debbie along, Mom announced, "We need to be in the basement. Lost and Alone (Part 1)

Text: Mark 4:39 - "Then He arose and rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, 'Peace, be still!' And the wind ceased and there was a great calm."

Also read Mark 4:35-41

It had been a fun day at the lake. As night fell over the campsite, Jim helped his dad put the tent up, and his mom and sister prepared to roast marshmallows over the campfire. Jim thought campfires were kind of boring. He was excited to be in the wilderness, and he wanted to go exploring. He had been told by his dad not to ever leave the campsite alone, but he just wanted to go for a "very short" little walk in the dark to explore. "Besides," he thought to himself, "Scamp would be with me." Everyone was occupied for the moment, and Jim thought they would probably never notice he was away. Jim took his dog, Scamp, and a flashlight.

Jim knew deep in his heart that this was the wrong thing to do, but he decided to do it anyway. He had not been gone very long when the flashlight he was using became dim. Fearing the flash light would completely go out, Jim determined to head back. About that time, Scamp heard a noise and started to chase something in the woods. Not wanting to lose Scamp, Jim just held on to the leash and followed behind him. Scamp could not be slowed down; soon the leash slipped from Jim's hand and Scamp disappeared. Jim looked around and realized he had not kept track of his path. As he tried to re-trace his steps, the flashlight began to flicker. In a few minutes, he was without any light. The sudden realization terrified Jim. He was alone in the forest. He began to hear all kinds of funny noises. He walked in one direction, then another. Finally, he stopped. He remembered Jesus knew right where he was. Jesus knew where his dad was, too. Jim sure wanted to see his dad, now, even if he was going to get in big trouble for not listening. Text: Joshua 1:9 - "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and of good courage; do not be afraid, no be dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go."

Also read Joshua 1:1-9
